


Please enjoy reading this issue and remember, we love ideas from you, so feedback is much appreciated!

October 2006 - Discovering woad in the classroom

In October, Class Three from All Saints'
Primary School in Thurlestone were trying
out different ways of dyeing cloth using
plants during their Art lessons. I had
grown woad from seed and the leaves
were now large and ready for use, so I
made a woad dyebath and took it along to
the school for the children to use.

The children prepared samples of cloth to dye. They used wax to create batik leaf designs and when these were dry they carefully dipped them into the warm woad solution. A woad dyebath is rather revolting and both its smell and appearance

produced much mirth! The fascinating part for the children was watching their dipped cloth turn from a pale green to a mid-blue before their eyes and we were able to discuss what and why this was happening - a bit like a science lesson in fact!

BEGINNERS COURSES

TUTOR Sue Dwyer

Starting again in January 2007. Courses are comprised of 6 x one day sessions spread over 6 weeks.

WEAVING LINEN

TUTOR Riitta Sinkkonnen Davies 13 - 15 March 2007

Riitta is from Finland where linen has a long tradition. She has lived in Wales for the last 30 years and has specialised in spinning and weaving linen. Riitta wove the vestments worn by the present Archbishop of Canterbury at his inauguration and has taught at several Association Summer Schools. This course will teach you how to manage and handle linen when weaving on a loom.

SILK INLAY WEAVING

TUTOR Sue Hiley Harris 13-15 May 2007

Inlay gives an almost complete freedom of design as yarn is laid in by hand to create the design areas in a plain weave background. A variety of techniques make different patterns and colour intensities.

During the course inlay techniques will be sampled before designing and weaving a scarf or hanging using commercially spun silk yarns. Emphasis will be placed on techniques to perfect plain weave, good selvedges and crisp inlay with silk. Multiple warping and cloth finishing will

WEAVING DEVORÉ

TUTOR Anne Field 4 - 6 September 2007

Ann Field has been weaving for over 30 years in New Zealand. She wrote the first 'Ashford Book of Four-Shaft Weaving'. About six years ago she investigated weaving collapsed weaves with very fine merino yarns as the weft. In 2004 she came to the UK to study at the Ann Sutton Foundation. Here she explored woven devoré using two types of fibre in warp and weft and then dissolving one of them in defined areas. The course is designed to teach you this technique.

NAVAJO WEAVING COURSE

On Monday 18 September thirteen people gathered at Devon Weavers' Workshop to learn about Navajo weaving. Our tutor Hannelore Cole had arrived in England from America the week before on her first visit to this country. She had brought a number of very interesting samples of Navajo weaving and the bright colours and geometric patterns were truly inspiring.

We were all provided with a wooden frame (loom), various sticks, pieces of string and 3 balls of coloured wool. We began by learning how to warp our looms using all these pieces and by the end of the first day most had got to the weaving





stage. We were then sent home to design a pattern using the three coloured yarns. On subsequent days we wove these patterns with help from Hannelore, who sorted out any problems. The days passed very quickly and I know I was surprised each day to see it was 4 o'clock. Although we did not finish our samples we had learned the basics and knew enough to be able to finish them at home - maybe then venturing into a bigger project such as a rug or wall hanging!

It was a most enjoyable course and a big thank you to Dorothy Tallentire for organising it.

REP WEAVE COURSE with Rosalie Neilson

On a beautiful sunny day in March a group of weavers from this workshop and from the local area flew from Exeter to cold, snowy Yorkshire to take part in the Association of Guilds' Spring Course organised by Sue Dwyer. We stayed in the rather grand Raven Hall Hotel, Ravenscar overlooking the beautiful coastline of Robin Hoods Bay.

Accommodation was top class, food excellent and the weaving wasn't bad either! I took part in the rep course run by Rosalie Neilson –an American rep expert extraordinaire! Having never tried rep before I was fascinated to see her amazingly artistic work during a slide show and felt inspired to learn. Rosalie was an excellent and patient tutor – especially to those of us who discovered that we had numerous threading errors in our ready-warped looms – and very soon we were all producing varied designs in our chosen colours. Rosalie worked us hard; the days were long and she never





tired of giving us time to explain new methods or helping us to correct faults! At the end of the three days we had produced a long sampler of several patterns and Rosalie gathered us together to discuss and compare our work. The course was fantastic and I arrived home full of ideas and intentions to produce more rep.

THE MAGIC THREADING with Nancy Arthur Hoskins

'Be a prestidigitator at the loom' we were told by Nancy on our first day! We were about to explore the wonders of the 'magic threading'.....a straight 8 twill threading no less, cannily put to work to produce an amazing array of designs in fancy twills, point twills, rosepath, boundweave, Krokbragd, rosepath, taquetés and many others. We wove letters, numbers, double Krokbragd, explored asymmetry on a 4-block point draft and asymmetry on a rosepath draft along with other unique weft-faced designs and all on such a simple threading.

We had arrived with our looms ready threaded with a 6 inch wide, 10epi warp – the polar opposite of the rep weave warp for the workshop above. But, whereas their weaving grew at a phenomenal pace, creating yards by the end of the four days, we crept along at a few inches a day, designing at the loom as we went. Nancy is an expert author and researcher on the subject of Ancient Egyptian Textiles and treated us to some fascinating talks on the subject, illustrated with wonderful slides. A magic course!

WEAVING & SPINNING

A survey of Surrey & West Hampshire Guilds

At the AGM of Devon Weavers' Workshop we discussed the value of the lottery grant we have received. With our workshop largely equipped with new Louët looms we are in a much better position to attract and teach new weavers and weaving is much less stressful and frustrating for everybody – yes, believe me! I have woven elsewhere. If I understand correctly, the justification of our grant funding is not just that we provide a space for meeting and weaving, but that through courses and exhibitions, we make, what could be a dying craft, available to a wide audience.

Jane Kirby, secretary of West Surrey Guild of W,S&D, recently conducted a survey of where members of the Surrey and West Hampshire Guilds (interestingly all respondents were over 40) learned their crafts. Among weavers she found only 10% learned at school and 7% at college. 36% were self-taught or learned at home. 9% had a private teacher or went on a holiday course and 17% learned through a guild. However, 21% learned at an adult education class. The proportion of people learning to spin in adult education classes was similar but a higher proportion learned through the guilds.


It would be interesting to see if these figures held nationally. It would be more interesting to find out how many LEAs are still running adult education classes in weaving. I would be tempted to do a survey myself, if I could make something on running a book...but I think we would all bet that the answer is very few. I will be tempted to find out, if any weaving grant application fails on the strength of the positive arguments, because I think this negative side supports our justification for funding.

A Tale of Two Workshops

Once upon a time not so long ago there was a place, with a room full of looms, where weaving classes were held regularly and many people came and learned and wove cloth and friendships. Some carried on developing their varied talents outside the classes. But times change and the wind of economics blew. Looms take up space that cannot then be used for other activities when the weavers rest. So more profitable use was made of the space, classes were disbanded and the looms condemned to the scrap heap.

Fortunately one of the talented and enthusiastic student weavers owned a barn and was generous as well as talented. As many looms as could be accommodated were saved and a small group continued to weave together developing their skills. Aware that the craft would die without the opportunity for people to learn, they dreamed of having a larger space where more looms could be set up and classes could run once again. A couple of years ago they decided to risk renting a space, hoping that they could recruit some people to pay to weave regularly and to come to classes to cover the costs.

Does this sound like the story of Devon Weavers' Workshop? Well, it could be, and we know that it was Erdmunda who generously offered space in her 'granny flat', and that Sue puts on courses, Ann applied for the lottery grant and Kay and Rosemary work tirelessly. The credits go on with husbands and sons doing their bit. There is now a well equipped weaving workshop where beginners can learn to weave and go on to join a group weaving regularly together, developing their skills with the help of each other and regular specialist courses.

However, other than the names and the lottery funding, this could also be the story of the Weavers' Barn in Oxford. Janet Philips used to teach day and evening classes in an LEA school, Ann Addyman has a barn and Anthea Clarke allows her home to be used as an exhibition space for 'East Oxford Weavers' during Oxford Artweeks - an older and larger version of Nine Days of Art. A group now weaves in a studio which is part of the barn where the looms were stored. Whilst there are no regular classes, several beginners have joined the group and learned to weave under the patient and detailed guidance of Dinah Clements.

I knew I was lucky to have a workshop so close to home in Oxford and felt privileged to be part of such a wonderful group. I am truly amazed at my luck in finding that the Devon Weavers' Workshop is on the doorstep of my new home...I wonder whether I would have found such a place had I moved elsewhere. Are there similar stories all around the country or is there something special about Oxford and Devon?
