## SILK WEAVING WITH INLAY

## with Sue Hiley Harris

This course provided both basic instructions on weaving with silk and inspirational ideas for embellishing it.

Sue Hiley Harris has extensive experience of silk weaving which she generously shared with us. Before the start of the course, Sue provided instructions on making a warp in either 20/2 or 30/2 silk and the suggested the best reed and sett to use for the chosen weight.

Then, on the first day of the course she demonstrated her preferred method of winding on the warp. This practical advice was useful for everyone whether new to silk weaving or experienced. Once we began weaving she advised a soft beat on a closed shed. This was to produce a loose weft to give the woven silk a soft drape.

There were a variety of inlay techniques demonstrated and the display of Sue's stunning woven pieces provided examples of these. We were shown the clasped weft technique that Sue uses to enable a section of the weft to be cut away so that a woven piece can begin or end in a point or angle.

Sue demonstrated a basic tabby inlay where the inlay yarn is put into the same shed as the ground weft; she showed us several others including an inlay using dukagang and one using a 3/1 twill. We learned how to inlay straight lines, how to turn corners to create squares and how to create 'eyeball' shapes.

On the final day we watched Sue 'whip' the tassels on her sample piece to create an elegant fringe and we were given further practical advice in a demonstration of wet finishing for silk.
















## Remember Winter ?!

## WEAYING FESTIVAL Jyderup, Denmark 9 - 10 June 2018

Ever tried carrying 9 rugs on a flight from Heathrow to Denmark, a metro into the city, followed by a train to a small town west of Copenhagen for an exhibition? Well, I advise against it. It is jolly hard work, although very good for personal weight loss.

I was one of three UK weavers invited to exhibit in 'Handmade UK', for 2 days, as part of a longer weaving festival, focusing on 'Scandinavian Weaves'. The event was organised by the 'Weavers Hus', an active and very talented group of weavers based in Jyderup, Denmark. Jyderup is approximately an hour and a half train ride from Copenhagen. Madeleine Jude from London, a superb weaver and maker of blankets, cushions and throws in Dubbelbinding, and Joan Baxter a top tapestry weaver from Scotland, were the other two weavers invited to exhibit. Joan also ran a tapestry weaving course following the exhibition

We set up on the Thursday evening, working well into the early hours, with experts on hand to advise on the layout and provide props and do lots of sawing, hammering and furniture removing. The result was lovely – the 'less is more' really showing off our work to its best. The space comprised a beautiful series of rooms in a C19 century old school overlooking a large lake and gardens. The sun shone, the crowds came and it was an exhausting two days of chatting about our work to, what turned out to be, mainly expert textile practitioners or researchers from the Scandinavian textile world.

We were lucky enough to be able to explore the rest of the festival during our stay – 4 other smaller exhibitions in the town and a larger festival site connected by shuttle bus, where there were talks, debates, short courses, music and market stalls.

And, at the end of the exhibition, it was just the simple matter of getting all the rugs back to the UK. A long, painful story, for another time.

## MARGO'S COURSES July 2018







#### Course One - 21 to 23 July 2018

We were a mix of Workshop members and visitors signed up to do a mix of block weave, double weave and Lampas weaving. Margo gave us notes for each structure, showed us samples of her own work using each structure and asked us to introduce ourselves and say something about our weaving experience. She then suggested we get started with her handout to guide us.

Margo advised weaving at least 6" samples with at least one repeat, even if we didn't like what we first did, we should commit to it, do repeats and we might be surprised! Her experience is that any design, once put in repeat becomes more professional and begins to look like a planned cloth. She also advised that we should look after our samples, as they could feed our weaving ideas in the future. She had brought some of her sample books from her college days with her and it was fascinating to see how well she has looked after her samples and how her ideas develop.

Margo looked at what each weaver was doing and made suggestions about what to do next - changing weft colour, texture or weight as well as lifting plan changes. I found it really useful to see others working with the same structure as me approaching it very differently. It was also great to see different structures and how much can be achieved.

Margo was a relaxed helpful tutor, and very quickly the group gelled and everyone was learning from each other. Having 3 days was really useful too as there was so much to think about! And now, so much to play with, to digest some of the learning! One of the participants suggested we have a group on Cluster to enable us share photo's of our samples which is proving useful too!

#### Course Two - 25 to 27 July 2018

I had an enjoyable, informative three days on the second Margo Selby course. As always Margot was a delight with her easy style allowing us to take our weaving and designing forward individually.

There were four members of the Workshop and eight visitors. The structure chosen by most participants was Lampas, but there were a couple of looms warped as double weave and for those that wanted it some tuition on blocks. Margo studied both Lampas and Seersucker in Paris at ANAT and uses the Lampas structure to weave her art works.

Having been sent basic instructions on what kind of warp was needed, it was up to each participant to decide what fibre to use its' colour and width. The only design restriction was the number of shafts available, (in most cases eight). For those doing Lampas two shafts are needed to be allocated to the tie down threads leaving six shafts or 3 blocks to design with. Jacqueline and Sarah (who was on the earlier course) shared the workshop Megado so had more blocks available.

We were given advice about the sett depending on whether or not we were using a second warp beam, but again this differed and we were able to observe the different weft coverage and the feel of the fabrics produced.

Margo taught in small groups and singly. We had individual tutorials at the loom on technique and design, with Margo encouraging us to explore colour and repeating designs, making samples of five to six inches long to allow us to best evaluate our work. She generously shared her samples, willing to tell us how she achieved the designs, and brought along a range of different yarns for us to use in our samples.

The three days went very quickly with everyone expressing a desire for a further Margo course. Margo's colour design rule, in each piece use -

- Something light Something dark
- Something bright Something muted

# A VISIT TO A NEW STUDIO January 2018



On a cold and bright Thursday in January, five weavers from the Workshop set off on a trip over the Tamar to visit Mark Cullen, one of our longstanding associate weavers, who lives in the village of Calstock, near Tavistock (thankyou-not Google maps). Now retired from GP practice, Mark spends most of his time weaving large colourful abstract rugs between periods of adventurous travelling in a camper van, with his wife, Nancy.


Mark is a member of the Devon Guild of Craftsmen and in 2017 exhibited four of his rugs at Riverside Mill in Bovey Tracey. Each rug is unique, usually revolving around 'nature' or 'landscape' themes, such as trees, birds or mountains. He uses three contrasting weft colours which blend together on each shuttle for each pass to help construct his lively designs.

He has mastered 'shaft-switching' and now uses this in all his rugs. At the end of 2017 he purchased a new and very wide Glimakra loom,

which he impressively rigged up with shaftswitching levers across the whole width (Peter Collingwood's system providing guidance here!), enabling him to create an infinite number of designs with just a 4-shaft blockweave threading.

His loom is situated in a wonderful 'new' studio, packed floor to ceiling with colourful rug wool and set in an old boat yard with other small artists' spaces and a 'drop in' café, alongside the River Tamar and all just metres from his home in Calstock. How lovely is that!

After a tour of the studio and short stroll along the riverbank we were treated to a delicious lunch and were able to discuss his plans for his rugs and share weaving ideas.





It was a lovely trip and a pleasure to see how one of our weavers has set about developing his weaving ambition and we look forward to seeing more of his rugs at Riverside Mill and elsewhere in 2018.
