



EXTENDING DEVON WEAVERS WORKSHOP

Sometimes it felt like it would never actually happen...but at last it has!

When our neighbour in Unit 9 popped his head round the door at the end of August 2022 to tell us he was leaving we couldn't really believe our luck. With the money so generously left to DWW by Audrey Fairbrother in 2021 we felt secure enough to sieze the opportunity to expand the Workshop without the hassle and expense of having to move elsewhere.

After extensive negotiations with our landlords work finally began in mid-March 2023. Double sliding, glass doors will connect the two units and enable us to run all our courses in the new 'west wing' while weavers continue working undisturbed in the original area.

The roller door in Unit 9 is to be replaced by a large window with opening casements, the light and ventilation from which will also benefit our existing space. New library shelves, cupboards and drawers will be built in the new area freeing up space in our existing Workshop. It will also be carpeted and painted before we officially move in.



Stewarding at Exhibitions & Helping in the Childrens' Tent

Last June a notice came around to all members asking for help in the children's tent at the Contemporary Craft Festival in Bovey Tracey. When we started Devon Weavers Workshop I always enjoyed stewarding at this event as well as others, usually going several days, but never ventured into the Children's Tent. Over the years I have withdrawn from helping due to age and DWW having many more members. So I signed up for a morning session in the Children's Tent with some trepidation. Would my energy levels keep going, would I have the patience required having had no children myself?

Well surprise, surprise I had a wonderful morning and thoroughly enjoyed myself. Youngsters came and all took to weaving like a duck to water. The looms had been threaded as a point twill

or rosepath pattern and lifts were written down for them to create diamonds as well twill. They quickly understood that they could produce spots or crosses in the diamonds depending on which treadling sequence they used. They were more excited to produce diamonds rather than straight or zig zag lines.

Having mastered this most wanted to experiment and produced extended twill patterns, they understood how to reverse the design from the mid point and once on the loom most did not want to leave but continued weaving for most of the session. The children left their addresses and the samples were labelled so at the end of the 3 days their samples were sent to them at their home address.

So I am looking forward to helping again this year and would recommend anyone, even some of our beginner weavers, offering to help as this proved to be a most enjoyable morning and although tired I went home feeling exhilarated.









BEST OF BRITISH WRAP

A CELEBRATION OF BRITISH SHEEP FLEECE

The handspun, hand knitted wrap below is often displayed at events where the Totnes Spinning Group are spinning and demonstrating their skills.

I completed it a few years ago when I was exploring British sheep fleece - the characteristics of the fleece freshly shorn, how to prepare it for spinning (and the variety of ways this can be done) and how the final results can differ depending on the type of fleece and how it is spun.

The final result shows the range of natural colours that can be found in native British sheep.





Some examples of sheep fleece used;

Shetland; a fine, high crimp, relatively short staple. I used fleece that was washed then handcarded as well as bought top. This was semi-worsted spun. The result is a fluffy, soft yarn.

Welsh mule; (welsh mountain crossed with blue faced Leicester); the fibre can vary from thick and wirey to very soft with a medium crimp on the same fleece. The softer parts were washed and drum carded (picking out as much of the kemp as I could along the way) then semi-worsted spun. The result is a soft, bouncey yarn with a slight lustre.

Gotland; a long fibre with a soft wave. This was washed and gently combed before being worsted spun. The soft yarn that results fluffs up when knitted so blurring the knitted fabric. Southdown; a fine down fleece with a high crimp. This was hand carded and woollen spun producing a very soft and bouncey yarn.

When the spinners demonstrate at events we display samples of all the different types of sheep fleece; Fine, Medium, Cross, Lustre, Hill, Mountain and naturally coloured.

Spinning equipment (L to R); niddy noddy, lazy kate (above), flick carder and comb (below), hand carders (above), English wool combs and diz (below).

Terminology used;

Crimp; the 'wiggle' in the fleece.

Staple; the length of the fibre on the sheep Kemp; the guard fibres in a fleece that are thick and wirey (and make wool itch next to your skin!).

Lustre; the shine from fibre (mainly from long wools).

Hand card; using large 'brushes' to separate the fibres and produce a rolag ready for spinning. (drum carder; a mechanical form of carding larger amounts of fibre).

Woollen spinning; spinning short fibres that have been carded producing a fluffy, airy, light yarn.

Worsted spinning; spinning longer fibres that have been combed producing top. The yarn is a denser, heavier yarn with an enhanced lustre. Lazy kate; holds the bobbins of singles whilst plying the yarn

Niddy noddy; winds plyed yarn into skeins.

COURSES AT DWW 2023-2024



RIITTA SINKKONEN-DAVIES 22 - 24 APRIL 2023

NEW FROM OLD

Create new and colourful items using fabrics from all those old clothes you have kept but would never wear again. You can weave them into a variety of items from bags and scarves to table runners and cushions as well as rugs and wall hangings.

Riitta inherited her love for weaving as well as for flax and linen from her grandmother in Finland, where she later completed a degree course in woven textiles. She has lived and worked in Pembrokeshire for 47 years running courses in her workshop and other venues.



MARILYN ROBERT KASURI - WARP & WEFT IKAT COURSE 1 8 - 11 SEPTEMBER 2023 COURSE 2 16 - 19 SEPTEMBER 2023

These are 4 day courses - the first 2 devoted to understanding the patterns, preparing the warp and weft threads, and dyeing them; during the last two days participants will dress their looms and weave.

Ikat is a woven resist technique. Threads are bound according to a pattern and then dyed leaving undyed areas where there are resist ties. Ikat is classified as warp ikat, weft ikat and double ikat, depending on which set(s) of threads are bound. The primary, traditional dye used for kasuri (ikat) is indigo. This will all be discussed during the workshop.

Marilyn is a textile designer who weaves, stitches and dyes. She continues to teach workshops both in Oregon where she lives and further afield. Since 2008 she has worked exclusively with dyes derived from plants and insects. She has visited Japan and while there studied kasuri (ikat) weaving, and other weave structures



COURSES AT DWW 2023 - 2024

ANGIE PARKER 19 - 21 JANUARY 2024 **KROKBRAGD**

Our Angie Parker course in November 2023 is fully booked, but it's not too late to book on Angie's January 2024 course - but hurry, places are selling fast.

Under the guidance of Krokbragd addict Angie Parker, you will learn to warp up and weave this weft-faced Scandinavian technique. Once you have the hang of the basics - exploring popular Krokbragd and double Krokbragd patterns, you will be encouraged to find your own style through play and experimentation; learn how to create your own contemporary structures and grow in confidence with your use of colour and texture.

LAURA THOMAS 20 & 21 APRIL 2024 DOUBLE CLOTH ON A POINTED DRAFT

This is an exciting workshop for experienced weavers already confident in designing and weaving double cloth structures on a block draft, to take their skills to the next level. You will follow a range prepared designs learning how to weave motifs such as triangles, circles, diamonds and other symmetrical motifs on a double cloth pointed draft.

LAURA THOMAS 14 & 15 SEPTEMBER 2024 2-END COLOUR & WEAVE LENO

This workshop will introduce you to the exciting possibilities of the 2-end leno weave structure with the added interest of exploring 'colour and weave'.

'Leno' is to twist warp threads around themselves as part of the weave process, allowing you to create an open, airy fabric that is still very structurally stable. This workshop will teach you how to do this as a 'loom controlled' process rather than finger manipulated.


DWW CHALLENGE 2023

Get Waffling Weavers!


Every so often we devise a weaving challenge for you all. This time it's waffle weave and, as usual, you'll have 6 months to come up with something, a sample, a towel, a bag, a scarf....in fact anything at all, woven in waffle weave or including some element of waffle weave. Threading and treadling is quite straightforward.

There's a lot to found in the DWW library on the subject - you can use 4, 6, 8 or more shafts. Jane has recently finished a lovely experiment in hand-dyed wool using waffle weave on 8 shafts on a Louet 40 (*below*) which many of you may have seen already in DWW.

The finish date is 30 September 2023 - we look forward to having an inspiring display of waffle for our noticeboards in the west wing of our newly extended Workshop!

Another braid workshop for members was held in DWW during March 2023 to teach the lovely craft of kumihimo using a braiding disk. This is a great mindful craft that is also portable - so, unlike weaving, you can take it with you and braid away indoors or outdoors.

We made some sample braids and some lovely bag charms using the techniques learnt. Everyone who attended enjoyed it and I suggested that when we have our new Workshop space a regular braiding group could be set up for any members who are interested. If you couldn't make it in March, but would like to have a go, I will be running another course in the summer.

WEAVING WITH LINEN

....our course with Riitta Sinkkonen-Davies in September 2022

There were two really remarkable things about this course with Ritta Sinkkonen Davies. The first was the amazing variety. Ahead of the course, Riitta provided each of us with a warp to dress and thread our looms - eleven different warps in eleven different threadings. Riitta organised the course as a 'round robin' so that each of us would have the opportunity to weave a variety of patterns using linens of different weights and colours. So many samples! from a delicate scarf-weight linen in pale blue to a sturdy green linen threaded to create a Christmas tree. Someone commented as she packed up her stack of samples that it was like leaving a party with a 'goody bag'.

Secondly, Riitta provided us with a wealth of practical and very useful information on how to handle linen – when warping and dressing the loom, while weaving, when washing the woven fabric and finally when ironing.
